

Dear Ones,

The fifth principle of Unitarian Universalism calls us to affirm and promote "the right of conscience and the use of the democratic process." On the Sunday before Election Day, there was a tradition in New England Unitarian churches for the minister to preach what was called the Election Sermon. The idea, as I understand it, was to offer non-partisan encouragement to fulfill our civic duty to vote, and, as people of faith, to vote our values. But this election year being what it is, I am reviving the Election Sermon tradition with a twist, using this Sunday to invite us to begin preparing for the period of time between Election Day and Inauguration Day — a time that may well be fraught. My sermon is called Stopping a Coup.

This Sunday, Yulia Yun plays piano and organ; soprano Hana Omori, accompanied by her father, Kazuhiro, on piano, sings Michael Jackson's *Heal the World*; tenor Daniel Rosensweig sings Pat Humphries' (Emma's Revolution) *Keep On Moving Forward*; and baritone Tevan Goldberg sings Stephen Stills' *For What It's Worth* and Bob Dylan's *The Times They Are A-Changin*'. John O'Connor is our worship coordinator.

In addition to all our usual gatherings in the Arlington Street Zoom room throughout the week, we have two special offerings coming up: on Monday, a conversation for those of us with parents in nursing homes; and on Friday, a conversation about the spiritual practice of making altars, in anticipation of El Día de los Muertos/Day of the Dead and All Souls Day.

Rev. Beth is making a slideshow for our service on Sunday, November 1st, when we honor our ancestors and loved ones who have gone before us.
