Dearly Beloved,

An email arrived this week from composer Shoshana Jedwab celebrating the fifth birthday of her viral composition, *Where You Go (I Will Go, Beloved)*. Our Executive Minister, Rev. Beth Robbins, chose this piece to close her ordination on May 6th, 2018, and thanks to Director of Music Mark David Buckles, we've sung it ever since! Shoshana writes, "During tumultuous 2017, I understood that my song *Where You Go* was called to this moment in history." The single was released on both the anniversary of the Muslim ban (2017) and the anniversary of the liberation of Auschwitz (1945).

The words of the first verse, which we sing at the close of the service each Sunday morning, say

Where you go, I will go, Beloved Where you go, I will go For your people are my people, Your people are mine Your people are my people, Your divine my divine

Shoshana Jedwab recorded additional verses, which begin, "Where you go, I will go, refugee / Mother Earth / children / ancestors." Listen here (click on the black arrow); I'm pretty sure you'll love it!

This Sunday, we'll open the service with the exuberant hymn, *Morning Has Come*:

Open our eyes to see that life abounds Open hearts to welcome it among us The light of love here shines upon each face May it bring faith to guide our journey home

followed by the astonishingly pantheistic *See Not Afar for Beauty* (penned by Unitarian minister Minot Judson Savage in the late 1800s!):

In wonder-workings or some bush aflame We look for truth and fancy it concealed But in earth's common things Love stands revealed While grass and flowers and stars spell out G*d's name

The Arlington Street Church Choir sings the African American Spiritual *Over My Head;* Mark David Buckles (banjo) and Julie Metcalf (violin) sing *The Rainbow Connection*, originally performed by Kermit the Frog (the late, great Jim Henson) in The Muppet Movie; and my sermon is called *Awe (Goosebumps)*. Our final hymn is *Blue Boat Home:*

The wide universe is the ocean I travel, And the earth is my blue boat home.

Until then, and always, I wish you ... goosebumps!
