Dearly Beloved,

Here comes Covenant Renewal Sunday, our annual celebration of generosity at Arlington Street, when we renew our great covenant of love and service — to dwell together in peace, to speak our truths in love, and to help one another — and make pledges for the coming fiscal year (which begins on July 1st)!

How much should you give? Interestingly, America's poor are its most generous givers. My colleague, Pastor Coletta Jones, minister of The Rock Christian Church, a low-income congregation in Washington, D.C., explains why her people tithe (that is, they donate ten percent of their income). "When you have just a little, you're thankful for what you have. But with every step you take up the ladder of success, the money clouds your mind and gets you into a state of never being satisfied."

Many years ago, Kem & I decided to try it — just try it! — and adopted the spiritual practice of tithing. We've never looked back. Giving ten percent of our income to organizations in whose work we deeply believe, with Arlington Street at the very top of the list, is a source of great joy to us. As you'll hear in Sunday's sermon, *Give and Take*, there's solid science explaining that joy. So here's a guideline for how much should you give: *Give until it feels good!*

Highlights of Sunday's service include hearing our own Anne & Ben Koffel speak about #ASCNation, accompanied by Pippa, one of our beautiful pandemic babies, whom her parents call "our littlest beloved spiritual companion." Director of Music Mark David Buckles and Bek Zehr sing *Give a Little Bit*. The Arlington Street Church Choir sings *Draw the Circle Wide*:
