This Sunday is Yom Kippur, the highest of the High Holy Days. Also known as the Day of Atonement, its central themes are repentance and atonement; it is a day set aside for fasting and prayer, the practice of making amends, forgiveness of others' transgressions and of our own, and returning to right relationship with ourselves and one another.

At best, we take a daily inventory — noting where we wish we had done better, apologizing if possible and/or paying it forward, forgiving ourselves and others, and beginning again. Joanna Lubkin leads us in a chalice lighting for Yom Kippur, Director of Music Mark David Buckles and Julie Metcalf sing Ben Harper's *There Will Be a Light*, and baritone Tevan Goldberg sings *Kol Nidre*, the prayer sung in synagogues on Yom Kippur. Yulia Yun (piano and organ) and soprano Hana Omori and her father, Kazuhiro (piano and guitar), bring us Mendelssohn to Hammerstein! Darrell Waters is worship coordinating. My sermon is called *Never Let a Crisis Go to Waste*. The words of the anthem — Sarah Nutting's (MaMuse)

I'm going through that gate You're coming with me We're all going home
