

Compost is decayed organic material, like food and paper, that can end up as trash—or be put to many eco-friendly uses, such as fertilizer. Why compost? If we don't, food waste ends up in a landfill or an incinerator. As we work to mitigate climate change, one important strategy is to reduce trash. The EPA estimates more food (75 billion+
