The Wednesdays Literary Salon Shakespeare's Sonnets

Shakespeare is not only the best playwright in our language; he's also the best sonneteer. The sonnet is by far the most complicated verse form in English (only Persian has a more complicated verse form); Shakespeare is the Roger Federer/Tom Brady of language. Moreover, Shakespeare's sonnets are his only truly autobiographical writing. Of the 154 sonnets, roughly two thirds are addressed to a beautiful young man, with the remaining sonnets addressed to the "dark lady" ("dark" because she was a brunette, thus contravening the Elizabethan standard for feminine beauty that called for blond hair and fair skin). Emotionally complicated, the sonnets tell of Shakespeare's passion for the young man, his concerns for the boy's future, and his sense of jealousy and betrayal as the boy becomes Shakespeare's competitor for the attentions of the dark lady. It's an emotional roller-coaster that provides a memorable ride! All are welcome!
