Engage with classical music through the creative listening approach developed by musicians Eli Epstein and Cynthia Ann Hale, as members of the Boston Symphony Orchestra perform Schubert's *Quartett-Satz (Quartet No. 12 in C Minor)* and Janacek's *String Quartet No. 2, "Intimate Letters."* At Inside Out concerts, audience members are guided through narration and demonstration to listen imaginatively into the emotional layers of music. As memories and associations are evoked through the music, connections are made to universal emotional themes. Many concertgoers report that their Inside Out listening experience is unique, meaningful, and changes the way they think about classical music.


### Benefit Concert for World AIDS Day

#### Steven Serpa, countertenor and composer

Monday, December 1<sup>st</sup>, 7:30 PM, in the Sanctuary

In honor of World AIDS Day, Arlington Street Church, the AIDS Action Committee of Boston, and countertenor Steven Serpa present *Translucence*. Written 10 years ago by British composer Donna McKeivitt, *Translucence* is an incredibly moving piece of music, invoking the poetry of film director Derek Jarman, who died with AIDS in 1994. It is scored for countertenor soloist, a trio of female voices, viola, and cello.

McKeivitt collaborated with Jarman on the music for his final film, *Blue* in 1993; the work celebrates Jarman's views on living with AIDS: the struggle, the loss, sometimes rhapsodic, sometimes comical. As a companion piece to *Translucence*, the event will also feature a world premiere scored for a quartet of vocalists and string trio, with music composed by Steven Serpa and poetry by Jeffrey Beam.

## **Friday Night Supper Program, Inc** **Help your homeless and hungry neighbors!**

The Friday Night Supper Program has been serving meals to over 150 disadvantaged people every Friday evening, never missing a single week, serving on holidays and through snow, storms, and power outages for almost 25 years. Here are two important ways in which you can support the Friday Night Supper Program:

### **HELP US REPLACE OUR FREEZER**

This year we will have to replace our freezer. After ten years of constant use, our current chest freezer is giving up. The doors no longer close properly, and it requires defrosting every week. This freezer is essential to the operation of our program.

The dimensions of our current freezer are 24 cubic feet (width 25 inches, length 70 inches). If you have a freezer in good working condition that you would like to donate, or you know of a retailer willing to make a donation to our non-profit, please contact us. We can only accept a freezer equal to or less than the above dimensions due to space restraints.

### **SUPPORT OUR ANNUAL HOLIDAY BAGS**

Each December, during our holiday meal, we distribute a holiday bag to our guests consisting of the following:

1. Warm item of clothing – men’s hat, gloves, or scarf
2. Toiletries - shampoo, soap, toothbrush, toothpaste
3. Pair of men’s socks
4. Holiday candy

You can support this annual tradition by donating warm clothing and toiletries. You can also create a holiday bag with the above items which we will give to a guest on your behalf. This year our holiday meal is on Friday, December 19<sup>th</sup>.
