## Today's Share the Plate: The Center for Ethical Living and Social Justice Renewal (CFELSJ)

Founded by the three New Orleans area Unitarian Universalist congregations, CFELSJ was born during the August that followed Hurricane Katrina. Arlington Street helped to gut and rebuild the flooded downstairs of First Church, where the Center housed and fed thousands of volunteers that poured in from all over the country to help with rebuilding efforts throughout the city. When the worst was over, CFELSJ partnered with The People's Institute for Survival and Beyond, and, building on decades of work for racial justice, hosted conversations about the history of white supremacist ideology and classism in New Orleans and created transformational political education workshops for guests from across the country.

The Center's initial model of service was built on housing volunteers. As rebuilding tapered off and revenue from volunteers needing room and board dried up, CFELSJ became unsustainable. This week, after fourteen years of serving the greater New Orleans area, the Center is closing its doors. Unitarian Universalists across the country are joining in thanking them and helping to raise \$10,000 to finish paying their staff.

The work of the Center for Ethical Living and Social Justice Renewal will live on through its founding congregations and through the extraordinary work they've done and the lives they've touched ... including ours. *Thank you for your generosity!*
