

This song was written by Billy Taylor, jazz pianist, composer, arranger, conductor, broadcaster, and educator. Dr. Taylor began his musical career in New York's nightclubs, playing piano alongside some of the great performers in the bebop movement. He was a jazz activist, founding Jazzmobile, an outreach program that brings free musical performances to people across the country; and cofounding The Jazz Foundation of America, whose mission is to save the lives and the homes of elderly jazz and blues musicians, including musicians who survived Hurricane Katrina in New Orleans. Critic Leonard Feather said, "It is almost indisputable that Dr. Billy Taylor is the world's foremost spokesman for jazz."
