

Today after the Children's Blessing, Rev. Dave and our children will gather in the Perkins Room for a chalice lighting, a song, meditation, and joys and sorrows. Then we will continue our exploration of the Hebrew Bible, by looking at the story of creation as told in the Book of Genesis. We will return to the sanctuary at the end of the service to join the Arlington Street Choir for the Recessional.

If you have arrived with a baby or small child who becomes restless, there's a nursery/playroom with the service piped in for your listening pleasure. Go through the leather door to the right of the pulpit and cross through the chapel. The nursery will be on your left before the stairs.

Share the Plate: Lend A Hand

Lend A Hand has provided financial assistance to low-income families and individuals for over 120 years. Working with social service agencies in the Greater Boston Area, Lend a Hand makes emergency and educational enrichment grants to help pay for rent to prevent eviction; heat and electric bills to prevent utility shut-offs; critical medicines and medical equipment; eyeglasses and dental care; and camp for Boston's children.

Lend a Hand, founded by Unitarian minister Edward Everett Hale, whose statue is at one of the Charles Street entrances to the public garden, is based on a story Rev. Hale wrote that tells of ten people who meet at the funeral of a mutual friend and discover that he had financially helped each of them. The ten resolve to follow their friend's example and to lend a hand to others in their community, amplifying their friend's generosity.

Lend a Hand assists over 450 households each year, but is not able to help everyone in need. Our donations will help them do more. Our own Bob Sessions serves on the board of Lend a Hand, and would be happy to answer any questions! *Thank you for your generous support!*
