My Country, 'Tis of Thee? John O'Connor

How can we recognize our country as one of liberty in a time when those who come to us seeking asylum have their children taken from them, or are indefinitely detained; when the color of one's skin may lead to arrest; and where neo-Nazis march in support of white supremacy? John offers some observations from the past, and holds up reason for hope.

Ovid's "Metamorphoses" is one of the most influential works in Western culture, having inspired Dante, Boccaccio, Chaucer, and Shakespeare among countless others. In fact, "Metamorphoses" was Shakespeare's favorite book (he read it in Latin), and it's easy to see why. The stories it contains are endlessly fascinating: Zeus transformed into a shower of gold to ravish Danae, Tiresias turned into a woman and then back into a man, Orpheus torn to shreds by furious Maenads. It runs from the creation of the world to the death of Julius Caesar, containing over 250 narratives in 15 books. Join Rev Kim and Professor Alan for three sessions and discover why this is one of the most beloved works in all of world literature. We'll be reading the Rolfe Humphries translation published by Indiana University Press. Amazon has many new copies from \$5.00, & you can find used copies even cheaper. All are welcome!
